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


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SLEDDING & ICE SKATING IN NORTHERN MICHIGAN

hen I was younger, some of the best winter fun we had was ice skating and sledding down the best local hills. We skated until we couldn't feel our toes anymore and stayed out sledding until we were forced to go home and eat dinner. That was a long time ago; apartment buildings cover the hill where we loved to sled, and the annual ice rink at my old elementary school is no more. But there are still lots of great places to go ice skating and sledding for FREE:

Grand Traverse County

- Traverse City: Thirlby Field at 14th and Pine Street A local ice rink favorite for many years!
- Traverse City: F&M Park at State Street between
 Railroad and Hope Offers a skating rink in winter.
- Kingsley: Civic Center South A regional park located in the Village of Kingsley offering a skating rink.

Benzie County

Benzonia: Academy Park – Adjacent to the Mills
 Community House, the park transforms into a skating
 rink in the winter. Skate rentals are available at the
 Benzonia Library.

Kalkaska County

- Fife Lake: Springfield Park & Recreation Area on Lund Road near Creighton Road – Carly's Hill has become a popular sledding area. Local groups came together to make this a safe sledding area for kids of all ages.
- Kalkaska: Twin Birch Restaurant and Golf Club New in 2024, Twin Birch plans an ice-skating rink in addition to their other outdoor winter activities.
- Rapid City: Heritage Park A popular sledding area with the locals.

Antrim County

- Elk Rapids: Marina near The Dam Shop Public ice rink located at the corner of Bridge and River Streets.
- Bellaire: Richardi Park located just north of downtown In winter, the village builds ice rinks at the park.

Leelanau County

- Northport: Braman
 Hill Recreation Area
 on East Melkild Road The park has an ice rink and
 sledding hills with a warming house and bathrooms.
 There is a fire ring at the top of the hill.
- Suttons Bay: Ice Rink Park at the corner of Broadway and Lincoln Street –Volunteers flood the area and groom the ice for skating and pick-up hockey games.
- Suttons Bay: Bahle Hill located just off West Street –
 This hill offers a warming hut that can be rented and
 holds up to 40 guests. Check out: suttonsbayvillage.org
- Leland: Leland Ice Skating Rink at Hancock Field Public ice-skating rink 100% funded by donations and maintained by community volunteers.
- Glen Arbor: Sleeping Bear Dunes The Dune Climb is a popular place for family sledding – but it's allowed only in designated areas. Check the website for details: www.nps.gov/slbe/planyourvisit/winteractivities.htm

Remember, these rinks and sledding hills are dependent on great winter weather conditions, so availability will vary. Pro Tip: Take along a thermos of cocoa and some snacks and you will be sure to create memories to last a lifetime.

Let's all do a snow dance in hopes of an old-fashioned Northern Michigan winter that will allow these rinks and sledding hills to be a reality for the upcoming season!



TRANSFORMING 8TH STREET:

A Journey from Decline to the Vibrant North Boardman Lake District

After decades of change, 8th Street in Traverse City has evolved from a struggling corridor into a lively destination that promotes healthy and active lifestyles. The North Boardman Lake District, commonly known as NoBo, is becoming a vibrant area where residents can work, play, enjoy entertainment, dine, and shop.

Situated between Boardman Lake and the picturesque Boardman neighborhood's charming Victorian homes and tree-lined streets, NoBo serves as a locals' Front Street. Its walkable, bike-friendly design allows for easy access to downtown, nearby neighborhoods, Hull Park, the new Boardman Lake Loop, the TART trail, the Traverse Area District Library, and the children's garden, among other attractions.

Those familiar with Traverse City have witnessed significant changes over the years, especially along East 8th Street. In the 1970s, drivers would pass Wares Auto Sales at Woodmere and navigate westward through a heavily commercial stretch of auto-related businesses. Juniors Tire Service is a hardy survivor, but as many of these enterprises relocated, 8th Street became primarily a

thoroughfare.

Considering many diverse opinions, the City of Traverse City enlisted the help of experienced urban planning consultants to collaborate with business owners, community leaders, transportation advocates, environmentalists, and citizens through a charrette process. Under the name "Envision 8th Street," the opinions of many were collected before plans were put

into motion. By 2017, the city commission adopted a resolution based on the consensus and endorsed a design that featured a three-lane roadway with planters

and off-street cycle tracks. This process also highlighted the North Boardman Lake District as an emerging business hub.

are committed to improving the overall quality of life in the Traverse City community while promoting the North Boardman Lake District as a dynamic city corridor.

Continuing enhancements in the NoBo corridor reflect the dedication of community members who inspired the "Envision 8th Street" initiative – a plan that has remained active and impactful.

THE HISTORY OF NOBO:

North Boardman Lake Area Business District

ther than a small sawmill, Traverse City's first structure was built near what is now the corner of Eighth Street and Boardman Avenue. After Capt. Harry Boardman bought 200 acres of virgin pine forest at the head of West Bay in 1847, his son Horace ventured up what was known as the Ottaway River to "discover" a small lake. Just north of where the river leaves Boardman Lake is where he and his crew built the Blockhouse, their shelter as they began clear-cutting what is now Traverse City.

The forest was downed in short order, making way for three massive sawmills between Eighth Street and the shore of Boardman Lake that supported the city's growth boom at the end of the 19th century. The problem was, most of the work force lived across the river in Old Towne, and the Union Street bridge was the only place to cross! So, it's no surprise that construction of the Eighth Street bridge in 1890 was critical to the mills and NoBo's development. In fact, before East Eighth was conjoined by the bridge, it was known simply as East Street.

Beitner's Mill was the farthest east and opened in 1887, not far from where the Woodmere Branch Library stands today. The factory specialized in fancy turnings for chairs, posts, and curtain rods.

At the head of the lake was the Oval Wood Dish Company, with its distinctive triple smokestacks. It opened in 1892 and quickly became the city's largest employer – over 600 in its prime. The mill made wood flooring and all manner of small items from hardwoods, including bowls, clothespins, rolling pins, and hangers, in addition to its flimsy namesake dishes – the equivalent of today's foam meat trays. Those greasy little dishes were regularly used for fire starters.

Farthest west, at the Eighth Street bridge, stood Wells-Higman, which made a variety of agricultural baskets and veneers from 1892 until it was destroyed in a huge conflagration in 1950.

Other early and notable NoBo businesses included the R.W. Round & Son foundry at 326 Boardman Avenue and the very familiar Cigar Box factory, built at Eighth and Boardman in 1920.

And finally, the Pere Marquette Railroad decommissioned both its freight and passenger stations in Old Towne and built a new depot on the north shore of Boardman Lake in 1927, proclaiming it "the finest station along the entire line."

REVISITING JIM HARRISON

As the days grow shorter and the sumac bushes change to a fiery red, I'm reminded of the legacy of the late Jim Harrison. Born in Grayling in 1937, Harrison attended Haslett High School and graduated from Michigan State University with a Master's degree in Comparative Literature. After a brief stint as an assistant professor at State University of New York, Harrison returned to Northern Michigan, where he became a legendary figure in Leelanau County. Prior to becoming a novelist, Harrison made his name as a poet when his first book, *Plain Song*, was published in 1965. His poetry focused on themes of man, nature, and his sense of spirituality, and he would continue to fashion poems until his death.

After an accident, Harrison was laid up for a period of months and was encouraged by friend and novelist Thomas McGuane to write a novel. The result was Wolf, A False Memoir, published in 1971, and this would change his career forever. The novel was adapted for the big screen, and Jack Nicholson played the lead role. This success led to work with Esquire, The New Yorker, Playboy, and Sports Illustrated as well as work in Hollywood as a screenwriter.

Harrison left Michigan and resettled in Livingston, Montana, with his longtime spouse Linda, and they split their time between Montana and Patagonia, Arizona. Even in his later years, his creative output continued at a furious pace. After the age of 60, he published a dozen works of fiction, another six collections of poetry, a memoir and a book about his exploits as a foodie.

Jim Harrison passed away in 2016 at his home in Patagonia. He was 78 years old and still writing new stories. Since his death, new work continues to emerge, with more to be published. But what of his literary legacy? In life, he was considered by many to be a modern-day Hemingway. Although he never experienced quite that level of fame and accolades, Harrison remains a bestseller and holds an honored place in the modern American canon. His first editions continue to be coveted by collectors, cementing his legacy.

any people consider the gift of a new puppy, kitten, or other pet part of their holiday celebration. While this sounds like a perfect idea, it's important to remember that adopting a pet is one of the most important decisions you will ever make. Animal shelters report that, sadly, many pets adopted around the holidays end up abandoned a few weeks later because the adopters weren't ready for the responsibility.

Before you're charmed by that wagging tail or those pleading eyes, recognize that you're making a commitment that could extend a decade or more. When considering a new pet as a holiday present, keep these ideas in mind:

Make sure your family is really ready for a

Pet. While welcoming a new animal into your home can be wonderful, it is also a life-changing event. If you're retired, you may have a lot of time to spend with a pet. If you're working or have children in school, think realistically about how a pet will fit into your family's lifestyle. How much time will you spend with your new companion? Adopt from a shelter or rescue

The Traverse Bay area has several excellent city and county animal shelters, in addition to organizations such as Cherryland Humane Society, HANDDS to the Rescue, and AC PAWS. Some shelters even handle rescued horses, rabbits, and reptiles. The Traverse area is also served by statewide rescue organizations that specialize in a particular breed, such as Golden Retriever Rescue of Michigan and Michigan Lab Rescue. Often, volunteers with these organizations will help you think through the type of pet that is best suited for your family.

Be prepared for the expense. In addition to adoption fees, the costs of food, supplies, veterinary appointments (including spaying or neutering), and dental hygiene certainly add up. For a dog, you'll also pay for annual vaccines and monthly heartworm/tick medication as well as potential expenses for grooming, boarding, and obedience training. The cost of caring for a new dog or cat typically starts at \$800 a year and goes up from there,

depending on the situation.

Be patient. Be sure to give your new companion the space, time, and support it needs to settle in and feel comfortable, particularly if it's a dog or cat. Most animals need several days to begin adjusting and several weeks to start learning your routines. It could be spring or summer before the dog or cat you adopted in December truly feels at home.

The origins of this profession stem more from events encountered in life instead of pages turned in a textbook, which makes coaches personable, life-tested, and trustworthy. Tony Robbins, a nationally known life coach, holds an annual conference in Florida attended by over 2,500 people and was the subject of a 2016 Netflix documentary. While pickleball has been around since the 1960s, it has gained momentum and popularity in the past few years and is now the fastest-growing sport in the nation. Dave believes the popularity is due to its multigenerational appeal. Mistakenly considered a sport for the 50+ crowd, it is, in fact, popular with players from 5 to 95, offering a fun way to be socially and physically active. He enjoys seeing grandparents on the courts playing with their grandchildren, laughing and having fun. Pickleball is generally easier to learn than other racquet sports, and four pickleball courts can fit into the same area as one tennis court, offering better utilization of space.

Pickle U currently houses eight courts and has two Professional Pickleball Registry (PPR)-certified instructors, providing multiple opportunities for play. Beginner sessions include two hours of round-robin play while employees are present to run the sessions and instruct the players. The round-robin format allows beginners to play with others at various skill levels, furthering their expertise. For more experienced players, check out leagues for men or women and open play for individuals or groups. Individual lessons with one of the PPR-certified instructors are also available. Pickle U also hosts special events and tournaments.

SNOWBILING

eing out in the glistening snow in the middle of the northern wilderness can be a refreshing and uplifting experience, and Michigan has over 6,000 miles of snowmobile trails to enjoy. That said, learning how to properly operate a snowmobile is of the utmost importance, since the average machine is capable of speeds up to 120 miles per hour off the showroom floor.

Planning ahead with these tips will make your new hobby more enjoyable and can help keep you safe:

Registration: Your machine must be registered through the state of Michigan with the registration stickers properly displayed. The only exception to this is when a machine will be operated ONLY on private land. In this instance, registration is not required.

Snowmobile Trail Permit: In addition to the registration, all sleds riding on open trails must have a trail permit.

Iraining: Operators between the ages of 12 and 17 are required to take a safety course before operating a snowmobile. Visit snowmobile-ed.com/michigan/ for the only approved online or in-person safety course.

Proper Gear: Staying warm is going to make your journey far more safe – not to mention enjoyable! Dress in layers, and consider taking extra socks and gloves just in case you experience wet feet or hands. A proper helmet will not only help you stay warm, it could save your life in the event of a collision.

Weather: Watch the forecast for warnings of high winds, blizzard conditions, or extreme cold, and stay home if bad weather is moving in.

Navigation: GPS and maps on your phone don't always work in the vast woods of Northern Michigan, so it's important to pay attention to trail markings. Consider printing maps to tuck in your snowsuit before you leave home.

In addition, it's best to journey out with experienced riders only. It can be easy to get turned around in the woods or to wander off a trail unknowingly. Do not ride alone! It's also easy to misjudge snow depth and become stuck in deep powder. This is another reason to always ride with others. If you get stuck, you can help each other out of difficult situations.

A great place to find fellow snowmobile enthusiasts who might welcome you to ride with them is the Michigan Snowmobile & ORV Association via their website (https://misorva.org/) or on Facebook. In addition, try searching for Michigan Snowmobilers or Snowmobile Riders of Michigan. You can also try modifying your search to include more specific areas such as Upper Peninsula or Northern Michigan.

All across the state, there are thousands of beautifully groomed snowmobile trails to help you step up your winter fun.

Each county has numerous trails with designated parking areas. The trails are named and marked with numbers, and these numbers are important to remember. If you have a situation where you need help, the trail numbers will help authorities find you. Snowmobile trails are generally open from December 1 to March 31, but dates can vary based on weather conditions.

PARKING AREAS

Grand Traverse County

- High Lake Road near Willsey Road
- Supply Road near Dead Horse Road
- East Blair Townhall Road

Kalkaska County

- Island Lake Road NW, near W. Airport Road
- M72 near intersection with Sunset Trail
- Intersection of Starvation Lake and Sand Lake Road NE

Antrim County

- Mancelona Road west of Crooked Lake Road
- Kregula Road east of US 131

(According to the DNR website, parking areas in Benzie and Leelanau Counties could not be confirmed at the time of printing.)

It is important to understand where you can and cannot ride. Always ride respectfully and pay attention to private property signs. Also be sure to educate yourself on local laws for riding inside city limits and on county roads.







After several years of restaurant success in Northern Michigan, Andre Bushell has opened Bushell's Kitchen + Cocktails at 127 South Union Street in Traverse City. Honoring his grandparents and African heritage, Bushell's latest menu features the soul food of his childhood.

"The restaurant is to pay homage to that happy time in my life," Bushell says. "The menu highlights some of the things I have grown up with and been exposed to."

Originally from Flint, Bushell says his customers go crazy for the menu items you can taste the love in. The menu features collard greens with braised ham hock, garlic and onions, the jerk beef with beef cheeks glazed in braising liquid, stewed onions, sweet potato puree, and baechu kimchi. He is especially proud of the flavor bomb pork dish featuring braised pork belly, smooth grits, scapes, and sweet pepper relish.

"We built the menu to be very neutral-loving and the spices are very familiar, but they are used in an interesting way that balances very well," Bushell says.

Bushell first learned the basics of running a restaurant while working through the ranks at his grandmother's friend's four McDonald's stores. Another entrepreneur who owned 45 chicken restaurants taught him even more. When he moved to Northern Michigan, he landed a corporate job where he met Loren Akerman. The two took the leap to open a franchise together and, after two years, opened Foundry Craft Grillery in East Jordan in 2019. They then added a partner, Adam Earle, and opened Foundry Craft Grillery in Elk Rapids in 2023, Dreloco Taco in Traverse City in 2024, and – Andre's latest labor of love – Bushell's Kitchen + Cocktails in Traverse City.

"None of this would be possible without my wife, Kelci; Loren and his wife, Leah; and Adam and his wife, Nichole; plus all of the people who work for us," Bushell says. "They help create the cultures in our businesses, and without them, we can't be movers and shakers."

For Bushell, who works long hours and speaks modestly about his success, he says having this opportunity to provide jobs year-round, and to live and work close to the water in Northern Michigan makes it all worth it. He loves the area and knows it is a wonderful place to raise a family.

Apricot Baked Brie

- 1/2 pkg frozen puff pastry sheets, thawed
- 1/4 cup apricot jam
- 18 oz Brie cheese rounds
- 1 egg, beaten
- Crackers and apple slices for serving (optional)

This recipe may be made as individual servings OR one dish that everyone shares.

- 1. Roll out puff pastry on lightly floured surface and cut into 4" rounds OR one large circle trimming corners.
- 2. Put a dollop of jam in center of each circle and a 1" piece of Brie on top OR 1/4 cup of jam in center of large circle and an entire 8" round of Brie on top.
- 3. Brush egg around edges of puff pastry and wrap around the cheese and jam to
- 4. Bake at 400 degrees for 30-35 minutes until golden brown. You may serve with sprigs of rosemary and fruit for a festive occasion.

Note: You may substitute apricot jam for cherry or raspberry jam if you wish. If you make an 8 oz wheel of Brie, you will want crackers and apple slices for serving.



White Bean Pot Pie


- 1/8 cup olive oil
- 1 cup sweet onion, chopped
- 1 cup yellow or red sweet peppers, chopped
- 1 cup carrot, chopped
- 1/2 cup celery, chopped
- 1 cup yellow potato, chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 cups vegetable broth
- 1 15-oz can cannellini, rinsed
- 1 15-oz can butter beans, rinsed
- 1/4 cup sundried tomatoes (not in oil), chopped
- 1 Tbsp white wine vinegar
- 1/2 tsp seafood seasoning (like Old Bay brand)
- 1/4 tsp cayenne pepper
- 1/2 tsp dried thyme
- 2 cups fresh baby spinach
- 8 drop biscuits dough
- Salt to taste

Preheat oven to 400°F.

- 1. Heat oil in a large pot with a lid. Add carrots and onion and cook 3-5 minutes. Add peppers, potato, and celery and cook another 5 minutes just until tender. Add garlic and cook for 2 more minutes.
- 2. Stir in flour and cook for 1 minute. Stir broth into mixture until smooth and cook until bubbly and thickened.
- 3. Stir in remaining ingredients (except spinach) and heat thoroughly. Add spinach last and heat until spinach is wilted.
- 4. Pour bean and veggie mixture into a pie dish.
- 5. Arrange eight biscuits (cut or drop) on top of mixture in pie plate.
- 6. Bake for 25-30 minutes until filling is bubbly and biscuits are browned.



re you looking for new ways to socialize and add to your circle of friends? After learning how one determined new resident met people after moving to Traverse City 38 years ago, the search was on for similar ways to do more than just "go out to dinner" with friends.

"When we first arrived in Traverse City in 1986, my husband and I didn't know many people," says *TBL* publisher Annie Stadel. "We decided to join the Newcomers Club and, even though I wasn't used to cooking lovely meals at the time, we signed up for a gourmet group, where we met several other couples. 

- 3/4 cup coconut milk
- 1 cup lentils
- 2 Tbsp coconut aminos
- 1 Tbsp curry powder

Sauté onion in the oil for 3 minutes until soft. Add garlic and ginger and sauté for 2 minutes more.

Add potatoes, salt, pepper, broth, coconut milk and lentils. Bring to a boil and lower heat.

Add coconut aminos and curry powder and let simmer for 15 minutes or until tender. If the mixture is too thick, add more coconut milk.

Optional: You may blend with a hand blender if you prefer that texture.
